REDUCTION IN CATTLE NUMBERS. Having concluded his review, Mr. Forde went on: "Although the scheme for the elimination of old or uneconontic cows is absorbing a large number of our unprofitable or lodger cows, there is still room for improvement in our dairy herds. From figures issued recently by the Department of Agriculture, upwards of 70,000 calves and 22,500 old cows were slaughtered during the period from April, 1935, to April,

1936. This continued slaughter of both the young calves and the old cows will bring about a drastic reduction in our future cattle population, and farmers in possession of useful Shorthorn heifers would be well advised to retain them to build up their herds.
